

6th Grade Summer Reading List and Journal Requirements

Summer Literature and Writing Required Assignments

All sixth grade students are required to read **Loser**, by Jerry Spinelli. Students should keep a list of any new vocabulary words they discover as they read, along with the definition. Students should have this book available for use during the first three weeks of school for discussion and assessment purposes.

- a. Students should research the author, Jerry Spinelli and find at least 10 interesting facts about the author, using at least two different sources of information. Students should come to class prepared with the 10 facts (either written or typed) on the second day of school. Please be sure to note the complete URL for the source of the information from a credible source. Note that the the URL should be specific to the information being used and not simply, <http://.thejerryspinelli.weebly.com> but more specifically <http://thejerryspinelli.weebly.com/society.html> so that students will be able reference the resource quickly in class.

Facts should include biographical information such as date of birth and other life milestones, education, family, awards, favorite books, reason for writing etc.

These 10 Facts will be used in class and will be collected for a graded assignment so please be sure to write your facts in complete sentences and to note your source for each fact Each fact is worth 10 points..

Writing Journal

In addition to the summer reading, all incoming 6th Grade Students are required to keep a writing journal with an entry once a week for 8 weeks. Each journal entry should be dated and should be at least one paragraph of 8-10 sentences in length. The topic of each entry is up to the student. It may be about the student's activities in a particular week or it may be about a particular incident that occurred. It may be their thoughts about something in the news or it may be their thoughts about the coming school year. It could be about things that they will miss about 5th grade or it could be about their pet. It can be about watching the paint dry. Topic is totally of the student's choice.

Subject matter is up to the student but the writing should reflect grade appropriate subject matter and writing abilities. "Today was a good day. I had fun. We went to the beach. It was hot. The water was cold. We swam. We had ice cream. It was good. We went home." Although this is an eight sentence entry, it is expected that incoming sixth grade students will provide more detailed information. 3 word sentences are not acceptable from 6th grade students. "Today was a great day because my family and I went to the beach to escape the heat!. My family and I built a huge sandcastle. Then, we splashed in the waves, swam and used our skim boards to stay cool. While we were drying off, my brother and I looked for seashells on the beach. We found our first sand dollar ever! On the way home, we stopped for ice cream at our favorite ice cream shop! I had a huge banana split with whipped cream and nuts! It was a great day of family fun!" Can you see the difference?

Also, please note that every entry should have an interesting opening sentence and not simply repetitive " .Today I did this". or "This week I did this"

Journals should be handwritten on lined paper. Some students prefer to type their journals and that is acceptable but not required. Each entry must be dated. Journals are due on the second day of school. They should be stapled together with an illustrated cover (hand drawn or clip art) and your name and grade. Hard-cover bound notebooks will not be accepted.

Journals will be graded as follows:
